Summer Assignment

You will be interviewing them about school busing and school desegregation in Memphis, so it will be important for them to remember something about those things. You must choose people that you think will bring different perspectives from each other. You may not choose someone who someone else in our class has interviewed. All Memphians, especially Harding students, are especially involved in this story. It is part of who we are, and it is important to investigate it from multiple angles. We will begin utilizing these interviews for a project the first week of school, so three legible, transcribed interviews must be turned in, even if it is not on the assigned paper.
